

years ago, he and Dick searched the ads in *Cars and Parts* and found an ad for the prospective vehicle just north of Toronto, Canada. The dollar difference between Canadian and U.S. funds made it an attractive deal, and they found the truck to be in much better condition than the way it was described. The former owner was a sixty plus retired school teacher and had parked the truck in a single car garage. The vehicle was purchased and towed back to Michigan. A near mishap was averted when a rattle was investigated and found to be due to a very loose ball on the trailer hitch.

Because of Sam's failing health, Dick did most all of the restoration of the running gear, including the installation of a late model ('53) Mercury engine. This engine has all the bells and whistles, being topped with a pair of Stromberg 97 carburetors on an Edelbrock manifold with Offy heads. It has a mildly lumpy Iskenderian cam pushing adjustable Johnson lifters. The engine springs to life at the slightest touch of the 12 volt electrical system. All these goodies are monitored by a set of modern Classic Instruments Gages.

The classic spoke wheels were straightened, necessary welding done, painted and shod with new Coker wide white wall radial tires. These were mounted on the hubs with a new set of '39 hydraulic brakes to bring the truck to a stop.

"I needed another car like I need a hole in the head, but I couldn't help myself. As we all know this old car thing is NOT a hobby. It is definitely an incurable disease," Phil explained and continued, "Thanks again to Sam, whom we will all miss, and also to Dick who handled all the mechanical restoration. The truck will be driven like a truck, not like a garage queen."

Phil has been a member of the FMRCOA for about 26 years, and has been on the Board of Directors of the Club as Secretary for 15 years.

Phil taught biology and the other sciences in junior high, and

high school in the Livonia school system for 30 years retiring in 1989. He has three daughters, two living in Livonia, and one in Kansas, and six grandchildren.

#### CZ Safety Series: Tips for Safer Winter Driving\*

A ccording to a recent Ford online poll of employees, the top winter concern is the driving habits of others. Below are some tips offered by a Ford technical driving expert that should help drivers maneuver more safely during the challenging winter weather.

- Make sure all lights, windows and mirrors are clear before driving.
- Adjust seat, mirrors and headrest.
- Verify that seat belts for all occupants are fastened.
- Slow down. In snow and wet conditions there is much less tire grip.

• Adjust your speed to allow maximum space around your vehicle at all times.

• Plan lane changes to be smooth, very progressive and slower in poor conditions.

• Scan more to locate other drivers in your vicinity.

• Look down the road – 2-3 cars ahead of you – and check to your left and right, including blind spots.

• Frequently check your rearview mirror, particularly when slowing down for traffic lights or other reasons. The driver behind you may not be able to stop safely.

 When stopping at a light behind vehicles, leave room to steer off the road if you see someone coming too fast from behind.

• If you have ABS and need to stop in an emergency, plant your foot on the brake as hard as possible and do not let up. You still will be able to steer because the wheels will not lock up.

• Avoid emergency steering maneuvers in snowy or icy conditions.

• Plan better and anticipate situations.

• If you are uncomfortable driving in certain conditions or have seriously reduced vision, stop in a safe area and wait or consider canceling the trip.



#### Ford Motor Company and the Michigan Proving Grounds: *Part I* by Bill Gipperich, FMRCOA Historian

I found a booklet at work (I work at the Ford Proving Grounds in Romeo) that was put together on the occasion of the track's 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in 1996. I thought you all would like to see how this facility came to be and how some of the roads were constructed and the kinds of different vehicles that have been tested. So here is the first excerpt from this booklet:

"In 1928 a gentlemen by the name of Edward F. Fisher, of Fisher Body fame, bought several small farms in the Romeo area, totaling 2500 acres, and began Hi-Point Farm. Over the next quarter century Hi-Point Farm would grow to become recognized as one of the world's greatest Hereford cattle farms. Soon after Fisher purchased the property and unbeknownst to his spouse, he began construction of a new house. The home, on a hill overllking overlooking Fisher Lake, was later to become known as the Fisher Mansion. The mansion was mostly Gothic in design, with pointing arches and flying buttresses. It consisted of 269 rooms, including an indoor swimming pool.

The grounds, surrounding the mansion held long walks to a circular veranda overlooking the lake, an open air theater, a fountain surrounded by biblical characters, an outdoor swimming pool, and a portico with a huge table depicting legendary sports figures. Separating the grounds from the surrounding land were heavy walls with picturesque towers and buttresses. Upon completion of the mansion, Fisher showed it to his spouse. Mrs. Fisher absolutely refused to move out of the city to the wilderness. So, without it ever being lived in, the mansion was sold to a wrecking company and demolished. In 1955 the fabulous Hi-Point Farm, one of the highest points in Michigan, with its beautiful rolling hills, rich tillable land, natural lakes, and beautiful orchards had been purchased by Ford Motor Company for a multimillion dollar proving ground. Ford acquired 4000 acres, most coming from the acquisition of Hi-point Farm. On April 1, 1955, the transformation of farm land into one of the most advanced proving grounds in the world began."

#### Postcards from the Past by Lou Ironside

This month our postcard returns us to the 1933 Century of Progress in Chicago with an exhibit that had close ties to Ford. Harvey Firestone was a close friend of Henry Ford, and his company supplied many rubber parts along with tires to the Ford plants.

The Firestone Company was an exhibiter that first year of the *Century of Progress*, while Ford Motor Co. did not exhibit until 1934. As I recall, the exhibit inside included a display of the entire process of making a tire. They also made several small rubber toys which could be purchased as souvenirs.

In the lower left corner is one of the "trams" which moved visitors around the fair. Now look slightly to the right and notice the man walking. Since he and the tram are nearly side by side either he is 12 feet tall, or the tram is 3 feet tall! It seems the artist got his perspective wrong...and no one caught it before printing.

#### Brian's Tip: *In the Groove* by Brian Kuta

Another issue that has kept many hearts up in throats is alternator belts being continually thrown off. It is very annoying, and I have known people that have taken their vehicles to dealers and service garages to no avail. Sometimes it is the pulley alignment, but if things have been put back to the way they came from the factory, consider looking at the thickness of the belt itself.

Now that a lot of our specialty cars are getting older, the manufacturers of many items have the tendency to consolidate things like alternator belts. To eliminate the need for having way too many different styles for different applications on hand, especially since many items do not move like they used to over their counters, that belt may be wrong for your



application. Besides mistakes in books, which is something we have all seen at one time or another, consider how the belt needs to fit into the pulley groove.



Make sure that those belts fit right!

If someone hands you a 7/16" belt, and the true requirement was a 3/8" belt, that belt will not seat into the pulley groove correctly, and it will always be jumping off for you. Basically, the top part, or outside of the belt, should just about be flat even with the outer edges of the pulley itself.


