

Lou's Model A Ford Station Wagon

Anyone who has read my "Roving Reporter" column over the past few years has probably noticed that I often mentioned finding some Model A Ford parts. Well; this is what they were going on, my restoration project of a 1930 Ford. The 1930 Ford station wagon model 150-B had a production run of 1940 vehicles. The 1929 style of wagon had been carried over until May of 1930 to use up old stock; then the new body style was brought out. That alone makes this a fairly low production vehicle, along with the delicate nature of wood bodied cars contributes to the low survival rate. But, since this was the year and style of the first woodie wagon I ever got to ride in, I have always wanted one. Over the past 40+ years I have owned several woodie wagons, but the 1930 Ford was always in the back of my mind...but usually unobtainable. In 2009 at Hershey a vendor had an absolutely terrible pile of parts which had once been a 1930 wagon used as a surf fishing vehicle on an Atlantic Ocean beach in Delaware. It had quit running some thirty years earlier and sat



in a salt water marsh. Needless to say it was pretty bad...but there again I enjoy a challenge, so it followed me home on the trailer. The salt water had not been kind to the running gear so another chassis was purchased from Dean Styles, a rebuilt motor from Iowa, a transmission from another place, and finally a reproduction wood body kit from New York. Small parts for woodie wagons are not the easiest to find, so a good year in parts hunting in Hershey might bring only four or five original parts. There are a few reproduction parts on the wagon, as some items just don't seem to exist. Finally, the LeBarron Bonney interior was installed on the front seat, and in October of this year I finally got to drive my wagon after three years of work. Right now I am waiting for the LeBarron Bonney order to do the middle jump seats, and making all the final adjustments to have it ready for the grand opening of the new Model A Ford museum in Hickory Corners, Michigan at the Rd Barns next spring. But you ask, what am I to do now that the wagon is done? That, is quite simple....start on my next wood bodied Model A project which I bought at Hershey this year....I had to buy it....my other Model A's were lonely.

trailers to quite the test for engine, transmission and brakes. Not that it was a big race, but there were 434 entries for that three day weekend race, a race like this ole boy has never been to until this experience. Yes, I intend to do it again in 2013, and I hope my good friends Paul and Debbie trailer their motor home so we can have the security of being with each other in case there is some issue.

For the people that are not familiar with my hotrod, it is a 1972 Ford Maverick that still has all of the glass and steel, except for the 20 pound weight savings on my fiberglass cowl hood installed to give me more hood clearance for the taller intake manifold and spacer under the carburetor. I raced in 32 races, but some eight were rained out. I made money in 13 of the 24 completed races with: Win = 1, R/U = 3, Semi = 0, 1/4's = 3, 1/8th's = 4, 1/16's = 1. Hey, I can't forget winning a Dialing For Dollars at Mid Michigan Motorplex, running a 10:380 on a 10:38 dial-in on an 87* day. The engine in my car is a 302 based Ford that comes out to exactly 348.3 cubic inches. An 850 Holley (by Kar-Go Carburetor) on top of an Edelbrock Victor Jr. Intake, AFR 225 cylinder heads, Isky valve springs, Research Engineering .700 / .700 lift, 268 / 276 duration @ .050, LSA 106 in at 104-3/4* cam. Diamond pistons, Scat rods, ARP rod bolts, stock Melling oil pump, Crane Gold Series roller rockers, rocker stud girdle, C-4 transmission (by Accurate Transmission), steel drive shaft, Moser 31 spline axles, Ford nine inch in a Ford Motorsport nodular case, Caltrac bars and Caltrac monoleaf rear suspension, and a bunch more little stuff that I just don't remember right now.

I got a little more out of the car to best my 10:19 ET in 2011 with a 10:17 ET this year, but the best speed remains the same at 131 MPH. I also picked up in the 1/8th mile from 6:43 to a 6:40 ET this year at 105 MPH, along with a new best 60 ft. of 1.356. As I am getting older I don't know that I have any aspirations to make my hotrod go faster, but do intend to make some minor changes in the interest of more consistency. I hope you all understand how much of a team effort racing really is. If it were not for the people that sponsor and help me in my efforts my racing could end, or for sure slow down considerably. I completely trust my sponsors, and know you can too. They are all good people, do great work, are priced right, timely with their

services, and I know you will have good experiences in your dealings with any of them. Again, if anyone reading my article would want, I would be more than willing to meet and introduce you to any owner of the businesses listed here in my article. Lastly, I have to give special mention to my son Mike, just because he does so much for me that is getting very difficult for me to do alone anymore.

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DECEMBER SHOW AND TELL

Shown here is an unusual set of "political" plates from the year 1932. Although there is no actual proof, it is generally assumed that the "letter" plates were awarded to people who made political contributions.



The "A" plates were friends of the governor, "B" plates the Lieutenant Governor, "C" plates Secretary of State, "D" Attorney General, "E" the State Senate, and "F" the state House. A few "A" plates have surfaced for 1931, and in 1933 plates started getting letter to

designate some counties. So, it seems that the political plates were basically made in only two years. Since in Michigan we can register our cars with year of manufacture plates, the odd-ball low number plates are in demand by the owners of all automobiles especially in 1932.
